

## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

### **Casual Rates of Pay**

One of our primary goals this year was to address the issue of casual rates of pay, and I'm pleased to report that we have made some progress toward establishing fair and equitable rates for Casual faculty members. Our ask to create a transparent system based on experience and credentials sounded simple enough; however, early discussions illustrated that this is a monumental and systemic change that will require time and collective effort to ensure it is properly executed. Through continued advocacy, we will ensure that Casual faculty members are compensated appropriately for their work in recognition of their invaluable contributions to our organization. We appreciate your patience through this lengthy process.

### **Artificial Intelligence**

The rapid advancement of technology, particularly in artificial intelligence, has presented opportunities and challenges for faculty. While many faced escalating cases of academic integrity issues, others began to explore how Al might be leveraged in and out of the classroom to improve learning and








## **CASUAL SURVEY SUMMARY**



- The response rate is representative of the size of the schools, with the most responses coming from Business, Global Access, and Community Studies.
- 88% of respondents are teaching three or fewer courses.
- We have a highly educated casual pool, with 42% of respondents having at least a master's degree.

## WHO NEEDS A COCKTAIL?

### Mango Mint Vodka Cooler

A vodka mango and mint cocktail that is refreshing and crisp. It's made with homemade mint simple syrup, mango juice, lime, and vodka.

### Mint Simple Syrup

- 8-10 Mint Leaves
- 1 cup Water
- 1 cup White Granulated Sugar ((or sub with 2/3 cup of honey, agave, or real maple syrup)

### Directions - Mint Simple Syrup

Bring sugar and water to a simmer in a mediumsized saucepan over medium-high heat. Cook until the sugar is dissolved. Off the heat, add in the mint leaves, and let the mixture cool for 10-15 minutes. Strain the syrup into a heat-proof glass that has an airtight top. Store in the fridge for 1 month.

### Mango Mint Vodka Cooler

- 2 ounces Vodka
- 2 ounce Mango Juice
- 0.5 ounce Lime Juice
- 0.5 ounce Mint Simple Syrup
- Club Soda

### Directions - Mango Mint Cooler

- 1.In a highball or double old-fashioned glass (10-12 ounces) filled with ice add vodka, mango juice, lime juice, and mint simple syrup. Stir with a bar spoon to combine.
- 2. Top off with club soda and give one final stir. Garnish with extra mint!

## WHAT ABOUT A SPRING APPY?

### Caprese Salad Skewer Appetizer

### **Ingredients**

- 16–18 cherry tomatoes
- 16–18 fresh basil leaves
- 1 (12-oz) tub of marinated mozzarella balls
- homemade or storebought balsamic vinegar reduction
- 16-18 toothpicks

#### Instructions

- 1. Add 1 cherry tomato to a toothpick.
- 2. Fold a basil leaf in half or into thirds. Place the toothpick below the cherry tomato.
- 3. Add a mozzarella ball at the end.

- 4. Just before serving, drizzle with homemade balsamic reduction. Serve with the remaining balsamic reduction on the side for guests to add more if they
- 5. Store any leftovers in the fridge!
